**Current Situation:**

A total of \$72,030,418 has been approved for Individuals and Households Program (IHP) and \$68,399,096 has been disbursed. Eight hundred and sixty-two (862) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$26,040,095.

Registration for funeral assistance is 352 as of COB September 28, 2011, and of that 164 requests approved for a total of \$1,112,290.

There are one (1) inspector in the field as of September 28, 2011; 50,218 inspections have been issued with 50,207 returned for 99.98 percent completion.

A total of 8,280 rental units have been identified as available.

A total of 366 Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs) were submitted to the State; 388 RPAs were logged into data entry and 388 were entered into Emergency Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE). One thousand eight hundred fifty (1,850) Project Worksheets (PWs) were received and entered into EMMIE and eight hundred seven (807) are obligated for \$85,432,901.

A total of 9,544,068cubic yards (CYs) of debris have been removed.

Fifteen (15) communities are active in Long Term Community Recovery.

**Hazard Mitigation Assistance (HMA):**

To date AEMA and FEMA mitigation staffs have conducted 81 technical assistance visits in the following counties: Bibb, Blount, Calhoun, Cherokee, Colbert, Coosa, DeKalb, Etowah, Franklin, Greene, Jackson, Jefferson, Lamar, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Limestone, Madison, Marshall, Perry, Pickens, Randolph, St. Clair, Talladega, Tallapoosa, Tuscaloosa, Walker, Washington, and Winston. To date HMA has obligated \$2,171,315 for State management costs and five (5) HMGP projects.

HMA submitted nine HMGP projects to HQ pending approval for allocation. The request includes 14 residential safe rooms, 2 community safe rooms, 1 generator, and 1 siren upgrade for a total of \$216,124. To date, HMA has obligated \$ 2,171,315 for 5 HMGP projects.

Staff completed 119 topographical maps for HMA HMGP projects. To date FMI staff has completed 769 topographical maps for HMA. During the current operational period, FMI staff conducted 140 site visits to determine the latitude and longitude of proposed residential safe rooms in Blount, DeKalb, Lamar, and Montgomery counties to assist the State in completing HMGP applications. FMI staff conducted 961 site visits to determine the latitude and longitude of proposed residential safe room sites in Autauga, Bibb, Blount, DeKalb, Etowah, Franklin, Lamar, Lee, Montgomery, Tuscaloosa, and Walker counties.


