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**5. Type of Incident:** The incident began on April 15, 2011, when severe storms, flooding, and tornadoes struck portions of Alabama. A second, more severe weather outbreak moved across the northern portion of Alabama during the early morning hours of April 27, 2011, with tornadoes, severe thunderstorms, hail and damaging straight line winds. Later that same day, numerous super-cell thunderstorms produced long-lived strong to violent tornadoes across the northern two-thirds of Alabama. The National Weather Service (NWS) official assessment has confirmed that 20 of the 62 tornadoes that struck the State of Alabama were rated EF1 to EF5 on the Fujita Scale.

**Hazard Mitigation Assistance (HMA):**

Staff conducted 83 technical assistance visits in the following counties: Bibb, Blount, Calhoun, Cherokee, Colbert, Coosa, DeKalb, Etowah, Franklin, Greene, Jackson, Jefferson, Lamar, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Limestone, Madison, Marshall, Perry, Pickens, Randolph, St. Clair, Talladega, Tallapoosa, Tuscaloosa, Walker, Washington and Winston.

To date HMA has obligated \$2,171,315 for State management costs and four (4) HMGP projects.

During the current operational period HMA mitigation staff has received 24 applications from the State for processing from the following counties: Autauga, Bibb, DeKalb, Franklin, Lee, Marshall, St. Clair, Statewide, and Walker, these applications were for State Management Costs, Warning Systems (1), Generators (2), Residential Safe Rooms (18), and Community Safe Rooms (2). Of these applications five (5) have been approved and obligated and nineteen (19) are presently under review.

**Volunteer Agency Liaison (VAL):**

VALs attended Choctaw County LTRC meeting, Butler AL, group discussed plans to move forward with disaster case mgmt, hazard mitigation program grant, and search for additional funds to resource cases. Construction manager will come on board Tuesday; Calhoun County Long Term Recovery Committee (LTRC) Meeting in Anniston, Alabama, Calhoun County. This county has received over 80 grants through their EMA for Safe Rooms, remodeled three mobile homes, repaired 12 homes, rebuilt three homes and two additional rebuilds are in progress.

Between the dates of September 1st and September 7th, 2011 VAL completed 47 Duplication of Benefits (DOB) for ten Counties and September 8th and September 14th, 2011 completed 22 Duplication of Benefits (DOB) for nine Counties.

Four cases were approved for home rebuilds in St. Clair County totaling \$149,000 for materials with labor provided by a voluntary agency. Three cases were approved for funding for personal property.
