Current Situation:

Small Business Administration (SBA) has approved over \$40M in loan.

A total of \$55,709,883 has been approved for Individuals and Households Program (IHP) and \$55,481,135 has been dispersed. Six hundred and twenty-one (621) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$18,755,542.

Counties with the most significant number of registrations are: Blount -- 1,131, Calhoun -- 1,435, Cullman -- 5,598, DeKalb -- 2,684, Jackson -- 2,360, Jefferson -- 12,799, Lawrence -- 2,091, Limestone -- 2,518, Madison -- 16,780, Marshall -- 4,596, Morgan -- 2,300, St. Clair -- 1,809, Tuscaloosa -- 12,326, and Walker -- 2,155.

Registration for funeral assistance is 335 as of COB June 17, 2011, and 124 requests have been approved for a total of \$808,256.

As of June 17, 2011, 21 Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs) were operational with a total of 29,269 visitors.

A total of 7,820 rental units have been identified as available.

A total of 370 Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs) have been submitted to the State, 369 RPAs have been logged into data entry and 369 have been entered into Emergency Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE). Eighty-seven (87) Project Worksheets (PWs) have been received and entered into EMMIE and thirty-nine (39) have been obligated for \$5,661,301. Two hundred and sixty-four (264) Kick-off Meetings have been completed.

There are 20 inspectors in the field. As of June 17, 2011, 45,395 inspections have been issued with 45,132 returned for 99.4 percent completion.

External Affairs (EA) has 149 Community Relations (CR) staff in the field, twenty-eight (28) are bi-lingual.

Fifty-seven (57) jurisdictions and two (2) lakes, Lake Martin (Tallapoosa County) and Neely Henry Lake (St. Clair County) have been approved for United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) debris removal assistance. An estimated 3.6 million Cubic Yards (CYs) of debris to be removed by USACE Mission Assignment (MA); a total of 2,997,300 CYs has been removed.

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Hours of Operation for the Joint Field office (JFO) are 0730 CDT to 1800 CDT Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday.

Threats or Disruptions to Infrastructure, Significant: Damages to private and public schools consists of four (4) with major damage, two (2) in Cullman County and one (1) each in DeKalb and Franklin counties; seven (7) with major roof damage, one (1) in Jasper City (Marion County), and six (6) in St. Clair County; and three (3) destroyed in Tuscaloosa County.

Critical facilities destroyed are Fire Station #18 (Jefferson County) and Kowaliga Fire Station #2 (Elmore County). Major damage occurred to the Cullman Emergency Medical Services (EMS) facility (Cullman County). Damaged and unusable facilities include the Tuscaloosa County Emergency Management building, Salvation Army building, and the Cullman County Courthouse.

17. Operations – Field Operations Branch (FOB):

The FOB Division Supervisors, Task Force Leaders (TFLDs), and Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) assigned to the divisions coordinated with key state, county, and local officials and held several meetings to address recovery activities currently underway, planned, and requested. Principal issues addressed involved public assistance (PA), temporary housing (TH), and debris clearance (particularly private property debris removal and associated deadlines to maximize financial assistance, long-term community recovery (LTCR), mitigation, and Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) closures

USACE has been approved to provide private property debris removal in 27 jurisdictions.

Debris removal has been completed in Pickens County.

Two hundred and sixty-four (264) Kick-off Meetings have been completed to date.

Private Property Debris Removal (PPDR) began in Elmore (Elmore County), City of Tuscaloosa and Tuscaloosa County.

One hundred and twenty-two (122) Letters of Intent (LOIs) received for an estimated total of \$114,848,329.

Community Education Outreach (CEO):

Mitigation advisors have counseled a total of 5,777 survivors at DRCs.

Outreach staffed seven (7) building supply stores in Jefferson, Madison, and Walker counties, and a local building supply store in Etowah County for a total of eight (8) building and supply stores. Outreach staff have staffed a total of 17 building supply stores in Calhoun, DeKalb, Jefferson, Madison, Marshall, Tuscaloosa and Walker counties; two (2) big box stores in Tuscaloosa County; one (1) hardware store in Jefferson County and four (4) local building supply stores in Calhoun, Etowah and Jefferson counties.

CEO staff has conducted outreach at 23 special events in Calhoun, DeKalb, Jefferson, Limestone, Madison, Marion, and Tuscaloosa counties.

Hazard Performance Analysis (HPA):

HPA staff has attended 40 Kick-off Meetings in support of PA with 57 potential applicants.

Staff attended a kick-off follow up meeting in support of PA at Talladega College (Talladega County) on June 15, 2011.

HMA staff attended 24 Kick-off Meetings with 244 potential applicants present.

Floodplain Management and Insurance Group (FMI):

During this operational period FMI has completed 34 flood reviews for PA, EHP, and temporary housing. FMI staff have completed a total of 126 flood reviews.

FMI staff have met a total of 269 floodplain managers or public officials out of 277 (97 per cent) in National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participating communities in impacted counties. All impacted counties have been visited with the exception of Lauderdale County.

Long Term Recovery (LTR) met with warehouse sub-committee coordinator to coordinate warehouse requirements for Hispanic community and submit request for other counties' needs for supplies in Decatur (Morgan/Limestone Counties). Staff provided vital FEMA information to Hispanic community through Decatur (Morgan/Limestone Counties) radio station.

Volunteer Reception Center (VRC) coordinator reported 17,319 volunteers have been registered, representing 98,963 volunteer hours.

Volunteer Agency Liaison (VAL) provided FEMA Overview and Long Term Recovery Committee (LTRC) development explanation and manual. Christ Episcopal Church was involved in the West Alabama Long Term Recovery Coalition.

VAL staff conferred with West Alabama American Red Cross (ARC) Executive Director and United Way of West Alabama Executive Director regarding West Alabama Long Term Recovery Coalition (LTRC) development.

Staff attended the meeting held for Faith Based Organizations (FBO) at Shades Mountain Baptist Church in Birmingham (Jefferson County). VAL made a presentation, introduced and encouraged LTR collaboration and discussed the advantages of collaboration with the ongoing Birmingham Long Term Recovery (LTR) committee.
