A total of \$70,731,132 has been approved for Individuals and Households Program (IHP) and \$70,372,913 has been disbursed. Eight hundred and fifty (850) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$25,677,695.

Registration for funeral assistance is 352 as of COB August 31, 2011, and of that 163 requests approved for a total of \$1,104,509.

There are five (5) inspectors in the field as of August 31, 2011; 50,120 inspections have been issued with 50,085 returned for 99.93 percent completion.

A total of 8,279 rental units have been identified as available.

A total of 366 Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs) were submitted to the State; 387 RPAs were logged into data entry and 387 were entered into Emergency Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE). One thousand three hundred six (1,306) Project Worksheets (PWs) were received and entered into EMMIE and seven hundred nine (709) are obligated for \$81,245,489. Three hundred eighty-four (384) Kick-off Meetings are completed.

**Hazard Mitigation Assistance (HMA):**

Staff met with representatives of the Northwest Alabama Council of Local Governments, Colbert County, to provide technical assistance, training on FEMA's Benefit Cost Analysis Module and discuss potential HMGP safe room projects.

Staff met with representatives of the City of Birmingham, Jefferson County, to provide technical assistance and discuss potential HMGP community safe room projects.

To date staff has conducted 83 technical assistance visits in the following counties: Bibb, Bount, Calhoun, Cherokee, Colbert, Coosa, DeKalb, Etowah, Franklin, Greene, Jackson, Jefferson, Lamar, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Limestone, Madison, Marshall, Perry, Pickens, Randolph, St. Clair, Talledega, Tallapoosa, Tuscaloosa, Walker, Washington, and Winston.

To date HMA has obligated \$2,171,315 for State management costs and four (4) HMGP projects.

To date, FEMA mitigation staff has received 11 applications from the State for processing from the following counties: Bibb, DeKalb, Marshall, St. Clair and Statewide. These applications were for State Management Costs, Warning Systems (2), Generators (2), Residential Safe Rooms (5), and Community Safe Rooms (2). Five (5) of these applications have been approved and obligated; six (6) are presently under review.
