Current Situation:

A total of \$60,863,868 has been approved for Individuals and Households Program (IHP) and \$60,255,457 has been dispersed. Seven hundred eight (708) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$21,382,942.

Counties with the most significant number of registrations are: Blount – 1,163, Calhoun – 1,510, Cullman – 5,707, DeKalb – 2,744, Jackson – 2,398, Jefferson – 13,319, Lawrence – 2,132, Limestone – 2,612, Madison – 17,136, Marshall – 4,715, Morgan – 2,340, St. Clair – 1,877, Tuscaloosa – 12,616, and Walker – 2,246.

Registration for funeral assistance is 340 as of COB June 29, 2011, and 147 requests have been approved for a total of \$1,016,022.

As of June 29, 2011, Nine (9) Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs) were operational with a total of 32,423 visitors.

A total of 7,642 rental units have been identified as available.

A total of 368 Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs) were submitted to the State; 374 RPAs were logged into data entry and 374 were entered into Emergency Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE). One hundred ninety-three (193) Project Worksheets (PWs) were received and entered into EMMIE and ninety-one (91) are obligated for \$12,810,865. Three hundred forty-nine (349) Kick-off Meetings are completed.

There are 19 inspectors in the field. As of June 29, 2011, 47,151 inspections were issued with 46,801 returned for 99.3 percent completion.

External Affairs (EA) has 85 Community Relations (CR) staff in the field, thirteen (13) are bi-lingual (including English, Spanish, Creole, Vietnamese, Laotian and Sign language).

Fifty-seven (57) jurisdictions and two (2) lakes, Lake Martin (Tallapoosa County) and Neely Henry Lake (St. Clair County) for a total of 59 jurisdictions, have been approved for United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) debris removal assistance. Two (2) jurisdictions have been completed.

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An estimated 3.8 million Cubic Yards (CYs) of debris to be removed by USACE Mission Assignment (MA); a total of 3,573,306 CYs has been removed.

Hours of Operation for the Joint Field office (JFO) are 0730 CDT to 1800 CDT Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday.

15. Threats or Disruptions to Infrastructure, Significant: Damages to private and public schools consists of four (4) with major damage, two (2) in Cullman County and one (1) each in DeKalb and Franklin counties; seven (7) with major roof damage, one (1) in Jasper City (Marion County), and six (6) in St. Clair County; and three (3) destroyed in Tuscaloosa County.

Critical facilities destroyed are Fire Station #18 (Jefferson County) and Kowaliga Fire Station #2 (Elmore County). Major damage occurred to the Cullman Emergency Medical Services (EMS) facility (Cullman County). Damaged and unusable facilities include the Tuscaloosa County Emergency Management building, Salvation Army building, and the Cullman County Courthouse.

Multiple State Correctional Facilities received damage.

16. Critical Resource Needs:

17. Operations – Field Operations Branch (FOB):

The FOB Division Supervisors, Task Force Leaders (TFLDs), and Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) assigned to the divisions coordinated with key state, county, and local officials and held several meetings to address recovery activities currently underway, planned, and requested. Staff facilitated the resolution of issues and concerns between officials and FEMA Program staff. Principal issues addressed involved public assistance (PA), temporary housing (TH), and debris clearance (particularly private property debris removal and associated deadlines to maximize financial assistance), long-term community recovery (LTCR), mitigation, and Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) closures.

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17a. Operations – Public Assistance (PA):

USACE has been approved to provide private property debris removal in 31 jurisdictions. USACE has completed eight (8) of eight (8) temporary critical facilities. Three hundred forty-nine (349) Kick-off Meetings were completed to date.

17b. Operations – Hazard Mitigation Branch (HM):

June 25-29, 2011: Fifteen (15) Mitigation Branch staff (Branch Director, Mitigation EA liaison, Mitigation ESF-14 liaison, FMI staff, CEO staff, and Division A Mitigation Staff), assisted by FEMA Intergovernmental Affairs, Individual Assistance, and Community Relations staff, participated in the Alabama League of Municipalities' 2011 Exposition in Huntsville (Madison County). FEMA staff manned booths and answered questions on safe room and other mitigation issues. Approximately 1000 residents of the State attended the Exposition on June 26 and 27, 2011.

Branch ESF-14 Liaison staff attended the HMGP Safe Room Application Development Workshop on June 29, 2011, in Tuscaloosa County.

AL Hazard Mitigation Grant program (HMGP):

Letters of Intent (LOI) – 857 received and four (4) HMGP applications received.

Community Education Outreach (CEO):

June 25-29, 2011: Mitigation advisors have counseled a total of 6,441 survivors at DRCs.

Outreach staffed five (5) building supply stores in Etowah, Limestone, Morgan, St. Clair and Shelby counties and three (3) local building supply stores in Shelby and Talladega Counties. Outreach have staffed a total of 22 building supply stores in Calhoun, DeKalb, Etowah, Jefferson, Limestone, Madison, Marshall, Morgan, St. Clair, Shelby, Tuscaloosa and Walker counties: two (2) big box stores in Tuscaloosa County, one (1) hardware store in Jefferson County and six (6) local building supply stores in Blount, Etowah, Jefferson and Shelby counties for a total of 32 outreach stores.

CEO staff conducted outreach at 41 special events in Calhoun, Chilton, Colbert, DeKalb, Jackson, Jefferson, Lauderdale, Limestone, Macon, Madison, Marion, Montgomery, St. Clair and Tuscaloosa counties.

CEO writers conducted seven (7) interviews and drafted 17 success stories, two (2) have been approved.

Hazard Performance Analysis (HPA): June 25-29, 2011: During the current operational period HPA staff conducted 13 site visits in Calhoun, Jefferson and Tuscaloosa counties to initiate a loss avoidance study on individual and community safe rooms.

HPA staff conducted a total of 13 site visits in support of Public Assistance to develop 406 mitigation projects.

Hazard Mitigation Assistance (HMA): June 25-29, 2011: During the current operational period HMA and State Mitigation Section staff conducted three (3) Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) Safe Room Application Development Workshops in the following counties: Jefferson (27 potential applicants); St. Clair (49 potential applicants) and Tuscaloosa (56 potential applicants). The workshops were attended by 132 potential applicants.

To date HMA and State Mitigation Section staff conducted six (6) HMGP Safe Room Application Development Workshops in the following counties: Colbert, Jefferson, Montgomery, Morgan, St. Clair, and Tuscaloosa. These workshops were attended by 229 potential applicants.

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Floodplain Management and Insurance Group (FMI):

During this operational period FMI completed 16 flood reviews for PA, Environmental Historic Preservation (EHP) and temporary housing. FMI staff completed a total of 163 flood reviews.

FMI staff met with a total of 277 floodplain managers or public officials out of 358 (77 percent) in National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participating communities in impacted counties. All impacted counties were visited.

Division A: June 25-29, 2011: Mitigation staff attended a PA applicant meeting for the East Limestone Volunteer Fire Department in Limestone County and met with the new Alabama Emergency Management Agency (AEMA) representative in Division A to update him on mitigation activities within the Division.

Mitigation staff attended the Alabama League of Municipalities Annual Conference on June 27, 2011.

Mitigation staff met with the Cullman County Emergency Management (EMA) Director to discuss the outcome of the safe room applicants meeting and met with the Madison County EMA Director to discuss potential mitigation projects on June 29, 2011.

Division B: June 25-29, 2011: Mitigation staff attended the AEMA AND FEMA HMGP Safe Room Application Development Workshop in Jefferson County and met with the Franklin County EMA Director on community and individual safe room designs and certifications.

Staff contacted all eight (8) Division B EMA Directors to inform them the Division had a FEMA and AEMA Mitigation Team available to assist with HMGP application development.

Division C: June 25-29, 2011: Mitigation and AEMA Mitigation Section staff met with the contractor for the City of Tuscaloosa (Tuscaloosa County) Schools to discuss mitigation issues on June 28, 2011.

Mitigation staff contacted the Community Affairs Director of the local hospital to follow up on the Hospital's Letter of Intent (LOI) and to inform him of the HMGP Application Development Workshop being held in Northport, Tuscaloosa County.

Staff met with representatives of the Centreville Volunteer Fire Department (Bibb County), to discuss safe room and related mitigation issues and attended the HMGP Safe Room Application Development Workshop in Tuscaloosa County.

Division D: June 25-29, 2011: Staff attended the HMGP Safe Room Application Development Workshop held in St. Clair County.

Environmental Historic Preservations (EHP): June 25-29, 2011: Staff conducted one (1) site visit with Department of the Interior staff in support of a Long Term Community Recovery plan and strategy in Holt (Tuscaloosa County) and one (1) site visit in Moundville Archaeological Park (Hale and Tuscaloosa counties) in support of PA.
