

1. CURRENT SITUATION:

A. BACKGROUND:

There were two waves of widespread severe weather on April 27, 2011. They first moved through during the early morning hours across northern portions of central Alabama producing widespread damaging straight line winds and isolated tornadoes. The second wave involved numerous supercell thunderstorms and produced long lived, strong to violent tornadoes across the northern two-thirds of central Alabama. There was widespread and catastrophic damage in several locations throughout the

 - Contract signed yesterday to haul units to the trucks Stops of America in Tuscaloosa as an interim staging while we GSA works to lease a more permanent facility.
 - 5 units moving in this morning, anticipating 5 more this afternoon for a total of 15, including MHU's, Park models and disability accessible units
 - PPI process started for the County to include the city.
 - Use of private sites was proposed to the Mayor of Tuscaloosa as strictly interim housing
 - Meeting yesterday Deputy Regional Administrator for the Atlanta HUD Office who indicated they have no resources to offer to survivors in public housing, section 8 or the homeless survivors within the city. The Housing Branch is working on assisting all of these survivors so that no survivor is left behind.
