SITREP/DECLARATION ID: Situation Report # 3 Hazardous Weather Outbreak 3/25/2009

OPERATIONAL PERIOD: 07:00 CDT on 4/01/2009 to 7:00 CDT on 4/02/2009

1. **SITUATION:**

A. **BACKGROUND:**

NUMEROUS SHOWERS...ALONG WITH A FEW EMBEDDED THUNDERSTORMS...ARE EXPECTED TO SPREAD ACROSS THE CENTRAL TENNESSEE VALLEY AREA THIS MORNING. SOME OF THIS ACTIVITY MAY CONTAIN LOCALLY HEAVY RAINFALL AND GUSTY OUTFLOW WINDS AS IT SPREADS NORTHEASTWARD.

LATER THIS AFTERNOON...A COLD FRONT IS EXPECTED TO SWEEP THROUGH THE OUTLOOK AREA. A LINE OF THUNDERSTORMS IS EXPECTED TO DEVELOP AHEAD OF THE APPROACHING SURFACE BOUNDARY AS IT MOVES EASTWARD THROUGH THE TENNESSEE VALLEY. STRONG TO SEVERE THUNDERSTORMS ARE POSSIBLE WITHIN THIS LINE...WITH THE POTENTIAL FOR LOCALLY HEAVY RAINFALL...DAMAGING WIND GUSTS AND HAIL. IN ADDITION...ISOLATED TORNADOES ARE POSSIBLE ESPECIALLY WITH THUNDERSTORMS THAT BREAK AWAY FROM THE MAIN LINE. THIS ACTIVITY IS EXPECTED TO END BY THIS EVENING AS THE COLD FRONT AND ASSOCIATED LINE OF THUNDERSTORMS MOVE EAST OF THE FORECAST AREA.

IN ADDITION TO THE THUNDERSTORM THREAT...THE GROUND REMAINS QUITE SATURATED ACROSS THE TENNESSEE VALLEY AREA WHERE HEAVIER RAINS FELL EARLIER THIS WEEK...ESPECIALLY FOR AREAS ALONG AND WEST OF HIGHWAY 231. MANY CREEKS...STREAMS...AND RIVERS ARE RUNNING NEAR OR ABOVE NORMAL LEVELS. THUS...ADDITIONAL RAINFALL WILL INCREASE THE CHANCE FOR FLASH FLOODING AND RENEW THE RISK OF RIVER FLOODING. FOR MORE INFORMATION ON THE POSSIBILITY OF RIVER FLOODING...PLEASE REFER TO THE LATEST FLOOD WARNINGS OR STATEMENTS FOR RIVERS THAT ARE IN OR NEAR FLOOD STAGE.

SEVERE THUNDERSTORMS WILL BE POSSIBLE THROUGHOUT THE DAY AHEAD OF AND ALONG A STRONG COLD FRONT WHICH WILL PASS THROUGH ALABAMA LATER THIS AFTERNOON AND TONIGHT.

DURING THE MORNING AND EARLY AFTERNOON HOURS...ISOLATED SEVERE THUNDERSTORMS WITH THE POTENTIAL OF LARGE HAIL...DAMAGING WINDS AND

THIS AFTERNOON...SEVERE THUNDERSTORMS ASSOCIATED WITH THE ACTUAL COLD FRONT WILL BEGIN TO FORM IN MISSISSIPPI AND MOVE INTO THE WESTERN COUNTIES OF CENTRAL ALABAMA AROUND 3 PM. THESE STORMS SHOULD AFFECT THE WESTERN COUNTIES OF ALABAMA FROM 3 PM UNTIL 7 PM...THE CENTRAL COUNTIES OF ALABAMA BETWEEN 6 PM AND 10 PM...AND THE EASTERN COUNTIES OF ALABAMA BETWEEN 9 PM AND 1 AM ON FRIDAY. THESE STORMS WILL CARRY WITH THEM THE POTENTIAL FOR LARGE HAIL...DAMAGING WINDS AND THE POTENTIAL FOR A STRONG TORNADO.




